Arundel Tulip Festival


Arundel Castle is very proud of its glorious gardens and their amazing annual Tulip Festival which normally attracts visitors from all over the world.

The Mayor's Hardship Fund.

The Coronavirus crisis, self-isolation and lock down has given rise to some people finding themselves in a desperate situation of having no money or resources to fall back on. They are essentially living day to day, hand to mouth. An unexpected expense, bill or broken electrical appliance can cause extreme stress and worry at a time when everybody is concerned for themselves and family.

Following discussion with the residents' associations, community wardens and other community groups in Chichester, it was decided to set up the Mayor's Hardship Fund to meet this need.

How does it work?

The initial contact is by telephone **07740621812** to the Mayor who does the initial filtering. The person applying will need to have a community contact eg member of the RA committee, community warden, social worker, councillor, vicar etc. The request is then passed to Clare de Bathe at the Chichester Welfare Trust for an experienced professional for validation, taking up references and administration. Items such as electrical appliances will be ordered on behalf of the applicant. The Mayor will resolve any issues. The normal turn around will be 2 days. All information will be kept confidential. The scheme has now completed its first pilot application and is live.

Who can apply?

Currently the beneficiary will either be resident, working or associated with Chichester. This is to give the scheme flexibility. Applicants will need to be 16 years or over with no upper limit. It is envisaged that the money would be available for a wide range of emergency needs obviously excluding non-essentials or what might be considered luxuries, such as alcohol or cigarettes.

To ensure as many people as possible can benefit, the usual sum awarded will be up to £250 with a limit around £300, although this will be at the discretion of the Mayor.

Funding

Although a need has been established, the size and scope of the need is unpredictable and unknown, like the crisis. Opinion is that a long period of social distancing and economic impact may mean that the majority of the need may come later. An application for funding has been to the Sussex Crisis Fund for £5000 and the City Council will be requested to match those funds if required.

There have already been offers of donations from the public and local trust funds.

Urgent Dental Care

Across every NHS region a Local Urgent Dental Care system has been created to provide care for people with urgent and emergency dental problems. Urgent Dental Care centres (also known as hubs) allow appropriate separation and treatment of patients in these four categories:

- 1. Those who are possible or confirmed COVID-19 patients including patients with symptoms, or those living in their household
- 2. Those who are 'shielded', as being at most-significant risk from COVID-19
- 3. Those who are vulnerable/at increased risk from COVID-19
- 4. Any other people who do not fit one of the above categories

All patients will need referral by a dentist. This could either be the dental practice they normally attend or an NHS practice nearest to their home address, which can be located on www.nhs.uk/using-the-nhs/nhsservices/dentists/.

Each patient will then be triaged and their care managed accordingly. Face to face treatment is available when clinically required.

An urgent dental care hub has been set up in Chichester. To access it, please phone a dentist (as above) - there is no drop-in facility, all patients must be referred by a dentist after a telephone assessment.
