Glorious Goodwood has survived

The centrepiece of the racecourse's season will go ahead in its originally planned slot from July 28 to August 1, but it will not be staged in front of crowds of close to 25,000 as usual – and it may be that no paying members of the public are allowed in at all. The size of the event hangs on what sort of public gatherings the government is allowing by the end of July – and Goodwood bosses admit that, at the moment, that is complete guesswork.

A national fixture list for June, July and August published by the British Horseracing Authority includes afternoon racing at Goodwood on Sunday, June 14, and Monday 15, and the five days of Glorious, from Tuesday July 28 to Saturday August 1. Also listed are Goodwood's three consecutive days of racing at the end of August, from Friday 28 to Sunday 30.

It's not known yet when betting shops will reopen, a move that will free up another major income stream for racing.

has managed to come together musically – while keeping its distance – to produce its very own lockdown song: Ku'u Pua I Paokalani. Appropriately, the piece was written by the Queen of Hawaii from a time of her own isolation – an echo of the isolation we are all enduring right now.

Members of the orchestra recorded their own parts and submitted them to orchestra director Professor Laura Ritchie. And Laura is delighted with the results: "It is something you need to practise, to be able to play on something like this, but these people were doing it in isolation with no guidance and for the first time as amateur musicians. They have done incredibly well. And when they heard it with everybody together, it was very moving. People from all walks of life have come together at this time of distancing, and it really is guite a feat."

An open letter from the Mayor 14 May 2020

The vast majority of our residents have followed faithfully the social-distancing rules and only 134 cases of coronavirus have been recorded in Chichester District. The number of deaths has not been reported, but it is understood to be very low. For me, however, there was a poignant moment when the number of those in the UK who had died from Covid-19 passed that of the entire population of Chichester.

The lack of clarity in the Government's latest recommendations has made people anxious that our efforts and sacrifices during lockdown will be lost. Realistically, little has changed and still the best advice is to stay at home if you can manage to do so. For information or advice, contact the WSCC HUB (Telephone: 033022 27980).

As a community we can feel proud of what we have achieved. The Mayor's Hardship Fund (Telephone: 07740621812) is working well for those left with nothing as a consequence of the virus. Please do not be too proud to call: we are all in this together.

The better understanding of how we catch the virus means we can with greater confidence exercise out of doors, but need to take more care indoors and in confined spaces such as on public transport where it is likely there will be a much longer exposure to the virus and more contaminated surfaces. Thanks to my wife's skills as a seamstress my blue tee-shirt has yielded a stylishly fashioned mask. I wear it now in the small shops and on public transport. The mask is not so much for my own protection, but rather to reduce the risk that I might unknowingly spread the virus myself.

The number of people who have coronavirus but show no symptoms is probably much higher than thought. In Iceland, a large proportion of the population was tested and, of those infected, half had showed no symptoms of the virus whatsoever; but they probably contributed significantly to the spread of the disease. Testing is so important.

The re-opening of the garden centres is both a relief and a help to our horticultural industry here in Chichester. The waste-disposal centres, too, are open again. You can now also buy and sell houses and go back to work, but social distancing will pose a major challenge. I am not sure that Stay Alert is quite the right message. It should be simply: Use Common Sense and Keep Your Distance. That is what I shall be doing, while remaining at home as much as possible.

Like all pandemics, this one will eventually pass.

What is open – and what isn't

Some **National Trust** coast and countryside car parks are re-opening, with limited spaces. Whilst the houses, gardens and parklands remain closed, they are opening some of their coast and countryside car parks so you can get out into much needed green space. You may need to book places in advance for some of these using a booking system on their website, although currently that does not include any locations in Sussex or Hampshire. From Monday 1st June the **Household Waste Recycling** site's range of items will be extended to include garden waste, general household waste, wood, cardboard, electrical items, bulky items, and furniture. They are currently unable to accept soil / hardcore, plasterboard, asbestos, tyres or textiles for the time being. Vans and pickups will be permitted on site with the correct permits.
