## Select and collect at the library

Libraries in West Sussex will be starting a phased reintroduction of services from Monday 6 July with a Select and Collect option from the front doors of all 36 library buildings.

We have reopened our library catalogue for reservations of specific titles but we realise that not everyone knows exactly what they want to borrow and so we are offering two different **free** services:

**Customer Select** – using the library catalogue for customers to reserve specific titles in the usual way online or by phoning their nearest large library. This includes existing reservations made before Monday 23 March.

**Staff Select** – allowing customers who may not know exactly what they want to borrow to ask for a more general selection of books, chosen by one of our expert staff. Customers can complete a simple online form, or phone their nearest large library.

Whichever option you have chosen, when your items are available we will let you know, by phone or email, and arrange for you to collect them during our more limited library opening hours.

West Sussex Libraries has also been delivering books to customers over the last three months via our Essential Delivery Service. This service is still available for anyone who cannot visit the library and would like to borrow a selection of stock or request specific items. There are currently no overdue charges for outstanding items, so please do not worry if you are unable to return your books at this stage.

### More chances to return your books

At the following times you will be able to return any borrowed items (books, audiobooks or school Project Loan boxes) to the door of your local West Sussex library:

- Tuesday 30 June, 2.00pm-4.00pm
- Thursday 2 July, 10.00am-12.00pm
- Saturday 4 July, 10.00am-12.00pm

There will continue to be no charges on any items that have not been returned during this time. It also doesn't matter if your books were borrowed from a different library to the one you return them to, or if someone else drops them off on your behalf.

### Broadband boost for rural homes and businesses

Residents and small and medium-sized businesses in rural areas of West Sussex can now benefit from the fastest and most reliable broadband connectivity if they choose to 'go gigabit'.

County, District and Borough Councils in West Sussex have worked together to jointly invest in topping up the Government's Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme to enable it to go further for our residents and businesses. Now rural eligible premises can claim up to £4,000 each towards the installation cost of gigabit-capable broadband, when part of a group of premises.

Gigabit-capable broadband enables internet download speeds of up 1000 megabits per second (mbps), much faster than current superfast speeds of 30 mbps. This next-generation connectivity has the potential to revolutionise rural communities, making them more attractive places to live, giving people the freedom to live and work more flexibly and helping develop thriving digital economies.

The additional funding will mean that customers will be able to use the voucher to pay for up to £4,000 of installation costs when they get a connection from a supplier that is registered on the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme. In most cases, the voucher fully covers the installation costs and the resident or business will only need to pay for the ongoing broadband connection package, in the usual manner.

To be eligible premises need to be within a rural eligible postcode, only have speeds of less than 100mbps available to them, apply in a group of two or more premises and sign up to a broadband connectivity package of at least 30mbps for 12 months.

# An open letter from the Mayor – 22 June 2020 (abridged)

Let me start by offering warmest thanks to all those who wrote saying how they find my open letters to be honest, reassuring and helpful. In this I take inspiration from the very personal style of the late Alistair Cooke and his weekly 'Letter from America' on the radio. Listening figures for radio have increased dramatically during the pandemic – further justification for our fight to save the local station, Spirit FM.

One day Alexander Armstrong asked listeners on Capital FM about their experience of losing access to a hairdresser. Some of Armstrong's listeners said they had taken matters into their own hands and several new styles have emerged: the highland cattle; the urchin, for those who didn't know when and where to stop, and, for gentlemen slightly thin on top, the 'Albert Einstein' or 'Ken Dodd'.

I am afraid my last letter was considered by some cyclists to be adversarial. That was not the intention: my priority is the safety of all. It did, however, prompt a useful discussion with the Chairman of the Chichester Cycling Forum and we shall be working closely together on cycling schemes and training.

Long before the coronavirus struck, one of the great attractions of Chichester for those moving here was that they felt safe. Some of us have now enjoyed the first taste of freedom in meeting other members of our family or friends, and I have witnessed many joyous reunions between grandparents and grandchildren in Priory Park, where social distancing and litter-removal have been admirably observed.

The city centre has opened up for non-essential retail and the shops have made a real effort to ensure you are safe from the virus. The windows are attractive, with many good offers, but the early evidence suggests we customers are reluctant to return. Why? The data shows that Chichester is probably one of the safest cities, thanks to the community obeying the guidelines and looking after the most vulnerable; but some, especially the elderly, have had their confidence eroded by the Government advice and actions, which they find confusing.

The truth is we will probably not feel 100 per cent confident until there is a cure or vaccine. However, it remains vital to observe the advice on social distancing and follow any advice and guidance given to you, especially in the shops, to minimise risk and to keep it that way.

It is imperative that we return to our fine, historic city centre and support local businesses, especially the independents, which were having a rough time even before the coronavirus hit. To wear a face-covering while shopping is wise and is now compulsory on public transport. At the market cross, Rotary has 'planted' a tree of colourful homemade masks which are available for a voluntary donation to the **Mayor's Hardship Fund** (Telephone: **07740621812**).

These will be refurbished and distributed to those in need. I have at least two old tablets and a smartphone in the cupboard . . .

## Sites re-opening

Bookable arrival time slots have been introduced and they are limiting visitor numbers by about a third. You'll need to book your visit in advance and show your booking confirmation when you arrive. Only book if you're sure you can make the date and time of your visit.

The first six sites will be followed by around 45 more on Saturday 4 July, and from Saturday 1 August, every English Heritage site will once again be open for you to explore and enjoy. Around two hundred free-to-enter sites are already open, including places like Iron Bridge, Caister Roman Fort, and many parts of Hadrian's Wall. There's no need to book your visits to free-to-enter sites.



## St. Bartholomew's Church for sale

The former **St. Bartholomew's Church** in Mount Lane has been put up for sale ([www.sprattandson.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2020/05/St-Bartholomews-Mount-Lane.pdf](http://www.sprattandson.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2020/05/St-Bartholomews-Mount-Lane.pdf)).

There is local interest in acquiring and retaining this asset for community use locally and more generally in Chichester, but the WGRA notes that any outline proposals should be financially sound so that it does not become a burden in the future. There is also the effect on those living locally and the need to control issues such as noise, parking and access.
