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Traffic Mitigation on Westgate

As you will recall, we passed a resolution at our AGM last November (2021) charging the WGRA Committee to secure the implementation of an automatic numberplate recognition scheme (ANPR) for Westgate. In early March 2022, a small party made up of WGRA Executive Committee members, other interested individuals, and a representative of WSCC with our Chi West County Councillor, Julian Joy, went to London to see for themselves the ANPR scheme which has been adopted in the London Borough of Hammersmith and Fulham (H&F).

Our team was welcomed warmly and given a detailed tour of the roads, cameras, and signage. The scheme works. There have been significant improvements since it was implemented: the volume of traffic passing through the borough's streets and feeder roads has been reduced significantly, there has been a commensurate reduction in both noise, pollution and accidents, and an uplift for pedestrian life and local businesses. Surprisingly, they have found that even the main roads in Fulham now flow better.

Our team discovered however, that H&F were only able to roll out their scheme because they are a London borough and subject to London Borough regulations.

There are plans to introduce similar regulations for the rest of the country in due course, perhaps as early as May but we are not holding our breath given the current parliamentary timetable. In the meantime though there is work which can be done. WGRA members are liaising with adjoining residents' associations to establish their views on an ANPR scheme for Westgate and opportunities are being sought to publicise our proposals city-wide. As the local team which went to London learned, it is vital to make plenty of noise to get noticed – and to keep that noise going!

Chichester Parking Zone Scheme / 2019 Road Space Audit

Some residents will remember the plans for an extended Chichester Parking Zone scheme informed by a Road Space Audit carried out in 2019. This was set up to look holistically at parking across the city, where to introduce new paid parking zones for residents and to manage the influx of commuter traffic looking for city centre parking outside the carparks.

Bold plans were put forward which included some changes to the wider western end of Westgate where less on-street parking is needed by residents, and there was even a plan to remove the northside parking places in this section up to the Sherborne Road roundabout to improve the streetscape and in time, potentially to provide space for a proper cycle lane. Public consultation took place across the city, but the scheme then stalled (we suspect) with Covid, budgets and some resistance from other parts of the City too.

WSCC have now confirmed that it does not have any plans to introduce any additional zones into Chichester at this present time. However, the Parking team are apparently willing to consider requests to improve residents' parking and to improve safety and access for residents to their properties. Of course, with no guarantees! WGRA are aware that some residents in the wider western end get fed up with commuters parking across their drives, where the white H lines are not enforceable and therefore this encourages people

to park badly, blocking driveways and making access and visibility difficult which, in turn, compromises pedestrian and cyclist safety. There may be other street parking or road marking issues too.

If you have any comments on the parking on Westgate, in particular: -

- 1. if you can see where an additional residents' parking space might be helpful and safe
- 2. if you would like additional yellow lines anywhere (e.g. changing the white lines near your driveway) to improve access and/or safety

The Tannery

Anti-social Behaviour

The Tannery site has been abandoned for many years now while awaiting redevelopment. As those of you who live in Tannery Close and in adjoining properties will know only too well, there has been more grief from continued anti-social behaviour on the derelict site ranging from alcohol and drug abuse to vandalism and forced entry to the buildings. Residents have also been intimidated by youths hurling missiles at windows. The Police have been called on several occasions but of course by the time they arrive, the malefactors have disappeared.

As WGRA Chair (and in my capacity as one of your city councillors), I met - with District Councillor John-Henry Bowden and County Councillor Julian Joy — with WSCC's Malcolm Mayo, as this is a WSCC site. He promised to fence the backs of the dilapidated properties adjoining Westgate which are now boarded up, and to bar entry through the archway which is on Westgate. The passageway from the archway into the now disused carpark is full of rubbish, a fence and part of a wall were blown down in the last storm, and the area sometimes is used as a lavatory by passing individuals at night.

Nothing has been done though and it is three weeks since we complained. I chased and was advised by Mr Mayo that their tenant has access on the side of her property, and he can therefore do nothing about closing the archway entrance. We hope that a compromise solution can be found.

Contamination

We also learned at this meeting with Mr Mayo that there are very serious issues with contamination on this site. It was a tannery of course and the earliest reference to tanning in the parish of St Bartholomew is 1549. There are consistent references to tanning in Westgate from the 16th century to the 20th century and according to Roy Morgan in his *Chichester: A Documentary History*, Phillimore, 1992, the ground is honeycombed with 120 pits each roughly 2 metre cubes. What this probably means is that WSCC will have to excavate the entire site behind the boarded-up buildings on Westgate to a significant depth and backfill it before any (as planned) housing development can take place.

Further, Mr Mayo advised us that the contamination has leached into the boarded-up buildings to a significant height, and he questions whether they can be saved. WSCC is currently undertaking a series of bore holes across the site and in particular in the vicinity of these buildings. We shall keep you posted of further developments.
